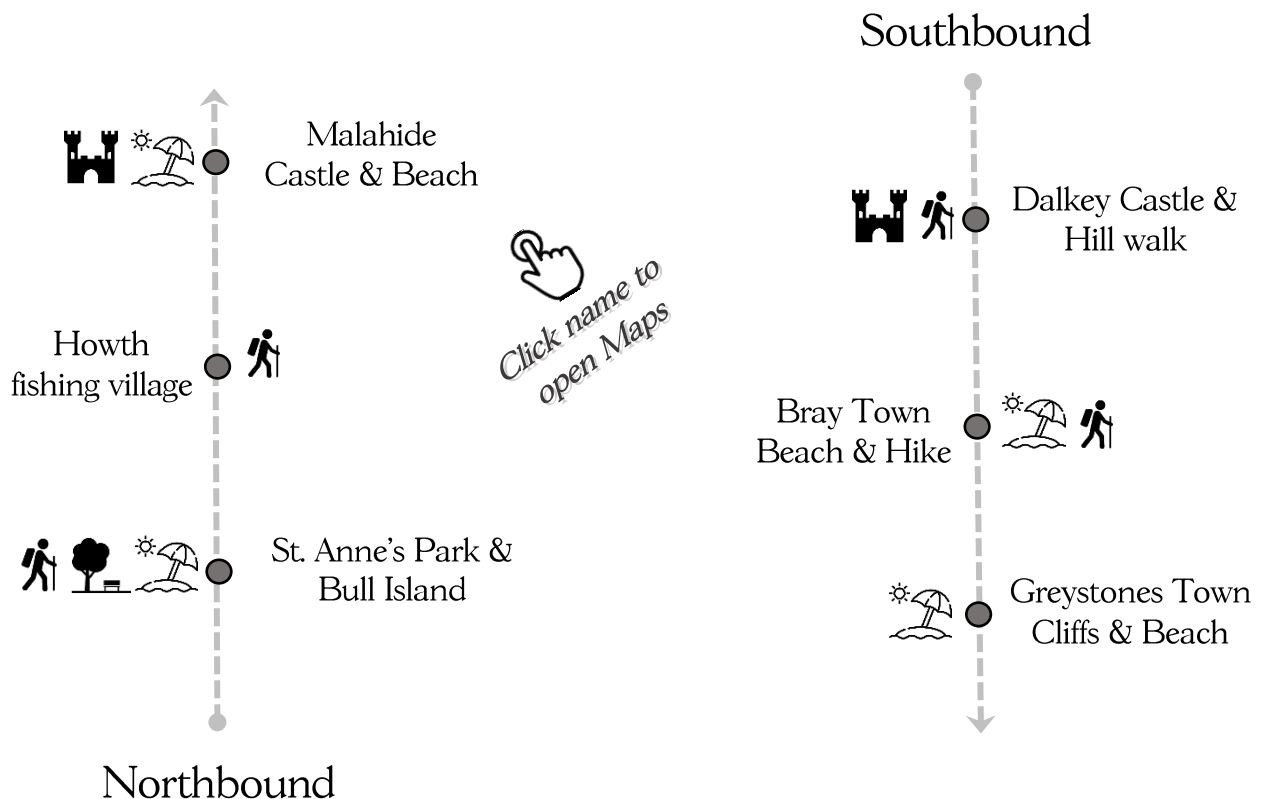
5 mins walk

NORTHBOUND




20 mins ride, stop in
Harmonstown station

St. Anne's Park & Bull Island



Bisected by a small river, the park features an artificial pond and a number of follies, a rose garden, a fine collection of trees with walks, a playground, cafe and recreational facilities. Don't forget to visit the Chinese Garden.

30 mins walk 



The island is home to lots of wildlife and there is an interpretative center where you can find out more about the many species that call the island home. There are also two golf clubs on the island. The wetlands are an important migratory bird habitat for birdwatchers.

Howth fishing village



Welcome to the small seaside village of Howth, where the land meets the sea and creates the most amazing natural environments for adventure and the great outdoors. Oozing with history and culture, Howth is one of Dublin's oldest working harbours with it ranking as one of Ireland's busiest fishing ports to date.

Malahide Castle & Beach




The magnificent medieval castle with a dramatic 800-year heritage.

Setting down roots in the medieval era, generations of the Talbot family called Malahide Castle home. Hear their stories, see the rooms where they lived and explore the surrounding 260 acres of lush parkland.

Explore elegant reception rooms and intimate bedrooms with their expert guides.

From battles to banquets, learn how the castle grew in strength and importance over centuries and continues to play a key role in Irish social and political life today.

Malahide beach is an expansive stretch of sand that runs between the town and the estuary. It is a popular spot with beach walkers with a mix of dunes, beach, footpath and promenade running along its 2km length.

20 mins ride, stop in Dalkey station

Dalkey Castle & Hill walk



Dalkey Castle is one of the seven fortified town houses/castles of Dalkey. The castles were built to store the goods which were off-loaded in Dalkey during the Middle Ages, when Dalkey acted as the port for Dublin.

Experience its history through the Living History tour which is a must-see!

A short walk from the town of Dalkey will lead you to Killiney Hill with its breath-taking scenario of Dublin city and the Eastern Coast all the way to Greystones.



20 mins ride, stop in Brey station


Bray Town
Beach & Hike



Bray is the biggest town in County Wicklow. It is known as the Gateway to the Garden of Ireland and is the longest established seaside town in Ireland. The scenic Cliff Walk is on the eastern side of Bray Head continues along the cliff path towards Greystones offering walkers a feast of views on the way.



The Cliff Walk goes from Bray to Greystones and is one of the most popular attractions Bray has to offer. The Cliff Walk is about 7 kilometres long, takes about 2 hours to complete and is suitable for all abilities.

Greystones Town
Cliffs & Beach



The town of Greystones is located on the east coast just south of Bray Head. Originally a small fishing village, Greystones has grown significantly over the past number of years but has not lost its friendly and welcoming village atmosphere.



Wether you were Hiking from Bray or enjoyed the sight of the cliffs through the train's windows, this pebbles & sand beach is the right place where to rest before heading back to Dublin.
